Low-Tech items to Help Make the Voting Process Easier






Pencil grips can help an individual hold a pencil better and alleviate writing discomfort caused by arthritis, repetitive stress injury, Carpel-Tunnel Syndrome and Writer's Cramp.



**Communication boards** make language visible and accessible for individuals who have speech impairments.



A **signature guide** helps individuals who are blind or who have low vision.



The *Access to Voting* **Pocket Guide** provides guidance on appropriate ways to interact and assist individuals with disabilities.



A simple **dry-erase white board** with a dry erase marker and eraser can help facilitate communication with a person who is deaf and/or hard of hearing.



A **full page magnifier** helps to increase the size of the print and allows for more of the page to be viewed at one time than a hand held magnifying glass.
