What is Title V?



The MCH Services Block Grant (Title V of the Social Security Act of 1935): The nation's longest standing public health legislation focused solely on improving the health of all mothers and children, including children with special health care needs (*CSHCN*)


Appropriates funds to states to:

- Ensure access to quality health services
- Promote the health of children by providing preventive and primary care services
- Provide and promote family-centered, community-based, coordinated care for children with special health care needs

Feature **Emergency Preparedness** and Response: How CDC DRH Addresses Needs of Women and Newborns

At a Texas field medical station in the path of Hurricane Rita, effects of the disaster were already taking a toll. Young women were being treated for medical conditions such as depression and anxiety. Elderly people too sick to evacuate were being

cared for by their daughters, sisters and nieces. Some pregnant women were being monitored while others were caring for their own families. As a medical epidemiologist and chief medical officer for Rapid Deployment Force of the U.S. Public Health Service, I was experiencing firsthand the challenges women face, particularly pregnant and - disaster strikes.

Clinical Settings

In order to increase testing, reporting, and follow-up care for child and maternal lead poisoning we provide strategies to educate and work with pediatricians, clinics, care coordinators, and other providers.

Childcare & Schooling

We ensure the safety of children by educating and working with schools, daycare centers, and other childcare programs on the need for lead testing and prevention, and to create policies for lead-safe environments.

A Housing

We provide solutions for educating and training homeowners, renters, contractors and others working in the housing sector on lead poisoning prevention and to strengthen leadrelated housing policies.

Community

We can address lead poisoning in the most impacted communities by working with community leaders and organizations to emphasize the need for lead poisoning assessments and prevention.

FOCUS AREA

Family Engagement & Partnership

This focus area is dedicated to equity in lead poisoning prevention. To have the greatest impact on areas of highest need – including housing and health outcomes – we must use approaches that support residents' ability to thrive and address issues within their own communities, *whilst being compensated for their work*.

Family Engagement and Partnership frameworks should be embedded in all programming, strategies, and actions.

Ask families to provide feedback and input.

Action 2

Organize focus groups for families.

Organizing focus groups is a great way to engage family members.

- > Here are some tips for focus groups
 - Follow <u>best practices</u> in asking family members to participate and address barriers to family participation.
 - O Compensate family members for their time and expertise.
 - O Use language and materials that reflect average reading levels.
 - O Work with a facilitator from the community.
 - O Gather information about technology and resources available to families to determine the best ways to provide feedback.
 - O Be mindful of people's privacy, especially around sensitive health information.










Telehealth in MCH Public Health Systems Project



Family Experience & Equity

- "Does the family's experience receiving care improve because of this work?"
- There is no evidence base collaborating with families is even more essential
- Families w/o access to care may = families w/o access to telehealth
- Focus on the racism built into systems & society
- Improving access from pre-pandemic
