  - Effective communication skills
- Basic reading/writing skills or has support to review material and keep notes
- Public speaking and an interest in teaching others
  - Time management skills
  - Follows directions and uses email
- Is available to travel (sometimes overnight)
- Has attended a sheltered workshop, a day program or a segregated classroom
- Has a strong interest in helping others with disabilities get community jobs

## 8 PEER TO PEER MENTORS

The purpose of the P2P project is to educate, inspire and encourage people to pursue their employment goals!

### RESPONSIBILITIES:

Complete an 18 hour peer mentor training and on-going trainings throughout the project;

Request any needed accommodations;

Communicate routinely with the Project Consultants;

Co-facilitate and lead P2P trainings in local communities;

Develop personal employment story to share with peers;

Assure that class attendance sheets and evaluations are completed;

Prepare for trainings and debriefs with co-trainers after each training;

Join the Oregon Self Advocacy Coalition's Employment Committee;

Routinely meet with and support two or more peers through the employment process; and

Participate in P2P evaluation.
